Japanese Pottery Masters of Shigaraki-yaki



What is Shigaraki-yaki?

Shigaraki-yaki refers to pottery produced in the Shigaraki region of Koka City (also famous as the home of the Koga Ninja Clan) in Shiga Prefecture (Michigan's sister state in Japan.) Shigaraki-yaki is known for the special quality of its clay, and its rusticity has communicated the traditional Japanese spirit and the aesthetics of wabi and sabi throughout history to the present day.

The History of Shigaraki-yaki

Pottery production in Shigaraki boasts a history of over 1250 years, tracing back to the year 742, when the Emperor Shomu built a palace in Shigaraki using roof tiles and vessels fired from local clay. Centrally located in the Osaka-Kyoto region (the hub of Japanese culture through the medieval period), Shigaraki-yaki took on an important role in people's daily lives (jars, vats, braziers) as well as in traditional arts such as the Japanese tea ceremony.

About the Event

Watch as pottery masters Mr. Shizuo Tamura and Mr. Eizan Okuda demonstrate their craft on stage, using their potters' wheels and deft hand movements to make clay dance and bend into beautiful shapes. There will also be a lecture on the history of Shigaraki-yaki, as well as a traditional Japanese tea ceremony performed by Mr. Okuda (who is also a certified tea master) using Shigaraki tea ware, allowing the audience to experience all aspects of the unique role played by Shigaraki-yaki in Japanese history and culture.

A certified master and instructor of both traditional Shigaraki pottery and the Urasenke school of tea ceremony, Mr. Okuda's teaware has been featured in exhibitions across Japan and has built up a large following among tea ceremony practitioners. Also a master of traditional flower arrangement, Mr. Okuda's works embody the refined subtlety of traditional Japanese art and culture.
